2017/18 CIS Uniform Policy for PreK3 to Grade 12

The official uniform for **PreK3 through Grade 5** consists of a short sleeved white or blue performance interlock polo shirt with the CIS logo and khaki bottoms. Certain events may specify one or the other colored short-sleeve polo shirt so ensure you have at least one of each color. Lands' End has made long sleeve polo shirts in white or cobalt blue with the CIS logo available. This is an acceptable alternative shirt for parents who want more sun protection or want their child to have long sleeves for cooler days. The official uniform for **Secondary** students is the blue Oxford shirt and khaki bottoms.

Only the official school uniform styles as represented by Lands' End are allowed. The direct link to Lands' End CIS website is:

<http://www.landsend.com/pp/SchoolSearch.html?action=landing&selectedSchoolNum=900038092>. The CIS website also has additional information to assist you in ordering. Should you have trouble obtaining Lands' End uniforms, please contact the office for assistance.

Students are required to wear the official school uniform, which should be clean with no holes, missing buttons, tears or frayed areas. Uniforms should not be altered to suit individual styles or preferences. In no case may a student dress in a manner which disturbs the instructional process, is too revealing, or creates a distraction. When not in proper uniform, a student will either be sent home to change or will be loaned alternative clothing for the remainder of the day. Continued disrespect of the uniform policy/dress code may result in further consequences. Underwear must not be visible at any time. Students are to remain in the school uniform for the entire school day. ***Please note the following additional information:***

Socks: Socks must be solid white or black in color. White knee highs are permitted for students in Early Childhood and Elementary.

Official Uniform Shoes: Closed toe shoes must be worn at all times. Official Uniform shoes must be **solid black or white** only, with matching laces (if any). Footwear should have heels lower than 4 cm or 1.5 inches. Flip flops, Crocs, or other beachwear are not permitted at any time. Shoes with laces must be tied. Shoes must always be worn on school premises and for school events. The No.1 Shoe Shop on Walker's Road and Atlantic Kids are aware of our school uniform shoe policy for both official uniforms and have available stock that meet our requirements.

Hats: PreK3 through Grade 5 students are required to wear a CIS school hat for all outside activities. Hats are available for purchase through the school office. Hats of other colors and designs are not allowed. Specific hat styles for grade levels are outlined on the Uniform Hat Order Form. Secondary students are highly encouraged to wear school hats when outdoors during daylight hours.

Sweater or Sweatshirt: A solid navy blue sweater or navy blue sweatshirt with the CIS logo should be purchased as per the uniform requirement through Land's End. Be advised that air conditioning at school or the occasional days of inclement weather may cause a student to want to wear an additional layer for warmth and only Lands' End outerwear or plain navy blue (without logos) will be accepted on campus.

Secondary Boys' Uniform: Khaki trousers and a solid brown or black belt must be worn by male students. Shirts must be tucked in at all times and all buttons must be done up with the exception of the top button. Undershirts, if worn, must be white in color and tucked in.

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2017/18 CIS Uniform Policy for PreK3 to Grade 12 con't

Secondary Girls' Uniform: Khaki long pants, capris (formal chino khaki material **mid-calf** length) skirts, or skorts (two inches above the knee or longer) can be worn by female students. Shorts of any length are not allowed. Only top-of-the-knee skorts on the Lands' End order page are permissible in the secondary. Pants or capris must appropriately cover the body. The Girls' fitted Short Sleeve Oxford Shirt with darts from Lands' End is the only school uniform shirt allowed to be worn without being tucked in for female secondary students.

PE Uniforms: The PE uniforms for **KG through Grade 12** must be purchased from Lands' End. Please refer to the school website for the official gray t-shirt and cobalt blue PE shorts. KG through Grade 5 students can wear their PE uniform and athletic shoes on the days they have PE. Secondary students will be required to change into PE Uniforms and athletic shoes prior to their PE class. Shoes appropriate for sports activities must be worn for PE by all students. **PreK3 and PreK4 students do not require PE uniforms.**

Swim Uniforms: Swimsuits for girls PreK3 through Grade 12 must be one-piece in cobalt blue or navy blue. Boys should wear swim-shorts or Speed-o style swim suits in cobalt blue or navy blue. Swimsuits that meet the requirements for both boys and girls are available from Lands' End. Rash guards in white, cobalt or navy blue (short or long sleeved) are acceptable as part of the swim uniform and are available from Lands' End's regular inventory. Secondary students must change in and out of their swimsuits in the dressing room at the pool.

Accessories: Only noiseless, safe jewelry is permitted. Students may only wear a single stud earring in each ear. Jewelry must not be a distraction or offensive. Tongue and other body piercing jewelry is not permitted. Hats or sunglasses are not to be worn in the classroom or for inside school events. Black or brown belts in solid colors must be worn as part of the requirements for secondary boys.

Hair: Hair must be clean, well-groomed, out of the eyes, and may not create a distraction. Hair coloring of an unnatural color is not permitted.

Music/Performing Arts Students: Elementary or Secondary students involved in NCFA, concerts, or other programs will be required to wear a school uniform (in good condition) and black dress shoes with white socks.

Secondary students must also have the following for special performances:

Solid black trousers (boys, girls) with a black belt or a solid color black skirt or skort two inches above the knee or longer (girls), with a solid color white shirt with a collar (no sheer fabric allowed). Solid color black dress shoes must be worn. Lands' End has our uniform pants and top-of-the-knee chino skorts available in black and the short sleeved Oxford shirt for both boys and girls in white. These are acceptable and recommended items for these performances.

Separate requirements may be applicable for dance and or other performing arts activities at the elementary and secondary levels.

Please Note: Any exceptions to the school uniform requirements must have the approval of the administration.

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
